Sustaining Community Schools Through State-Level Blending & Braiding

More than 8 states directly fund Community Schools, and over 30 states support initiatives aligned with Community Schools. It is essential to explore how to blend and braid state funds, which involves using different funding sources to support Community Schools.

Actions & Partnerships

Collaboration with State Partners



State Departments of Education, State Boards, State Education Agencies and Local Education Agencies can help you:

- Identify federal and state funding streams
- Learn about upcoming grants and opportunities
- Build partnerships and gain access to cross-department funds (such as funds to support health clinics)

Educating on Impact & Advocating for Increased Funding



Loss or reduction of federal funding intensifies competition for non-federal funding and resources. Here are four steps to consider:

- Build relationships with state and local elected officials
- Share impact stories and data outcomes from your Community Schools
- Invite elected officials and media to your events or to visit your school
- Form coalitions with other education organizations and groups from your state





Identifying Funding Streams by Community School Essential:

Powerful Student and Family Engagement



Family engagement remains a bipartisan priority of schools. An effective approach is to focus on low-cost, high impact strategies that increase communication and trust. Examples include:

- Minnesota: MN Department of Education's <u>Olmstead Family and</u> <u>Community Engagement Grant</u>
- Kentucky: <u>FY26 Community Education RFA (Closed)</u>

Expanded and Enriched Learning Opportunities



Continue providing before-, after-school and summer opportunities for students, by pursuing state grants to fund out-of-school programming. Examples include:

- Tennessee: The Lottery for Education Afterschool Programs (LEAPs)
- North Carolina: Grants like the <u>Extended Learning and Integrated</u> <u>Student Supports (ELISS) Competitive Grant Program</u>

Rigorous, Community-connected Classroom Instruction



Bridge communities and classroom learning and partnership opportunities by tapping into Career & Technical Education (CTE) funds and partnership grants. Examples include:

- National: Partnership for Student Success' <u>Community Collaboration</u> <u>Challenge</u>
- State: Texas' Summer Career & Technical Education Grant



Identifying Funding Streams by Community School Essential:

Integrated Student Supports



Coordinate health and social services, academic and nonacademic supports, and enrichment opportunities through state-level health & wellness funding. Examples include:

- Texas: Community Mental Health Grant Program
- School-based Health Clinic (SBHC): Funding available in many states
- Illinois: Illinois Afterschool Network Trainings, state networks nationwide

Collaborative Leadership and Shared Power and Voice:



Coordinate formal and informal structures for families, students, teachers, principals, and community partners to make decisions together through professional development and youth leadership grants. Examples include:

• National: <u>National Youth Leadership Council's</u> \$1,000 grants to youth led-teams to create service-learning projects

A Culture of Belonging, Safety, and Care:



Develop schools as welcoming places, valuing experiences and fostering caring and trusting relationships. Examples include:

- Idaho: <u>Idaho Future Fund</u>
- Maryland: <u>Public School Opportunities Enhancement Program</u>

Identifying Funding Streams by Geographical Area:

Urban



Urban areas often have a expansive network of nonprofit partners, access to local government initiatives, and philanthropy funds.

- Engage with the school district, the City Mayor's office, local foundations supporting youth and education, health departments with grants for school-based services.
- Federal: HUD <u>Community Development Block Grant Program</u>

Suburban



Suburban schools serve students with diverse and evolving needs. These schools can tap into general state and federal education funding to support a Community Schools model.

- Massachusetts: <u>SEL & Mental Health Grant</u> (Integrated Student Supports)
- Maryland: <u>Public School Opportunities Enhancement Program</u> (Expanded learning)

Rural



Rural schools often serve as the hub of the community, and may qualify for funding streams specifically reserved for rural areas.

- Texas: Title V, Part B <u>Rural Education Initiative</u> (Community-connected instruction, Family Engagement, Integrated Supports)
- National: Appalachian Regional Commission's <u>READY Grants to</u> <u>Grow</u> (capacity-building for individuals/organizations/ communities)
